There is a definite need for closer cooperation between the schools, the universities, and employers and the NMBM to ensure seamless transitions at all levels as we build a workforce that would be able to drive a thriving economy.

To the learners, I say, exhibitors will be disseminating a lot of information about their organisations and companies. Do take advantage of this opportunity to learn more about career paths and career options that are available. Acquaint yourself with what they have to offer and collect the information that you receive from the various exhibitors because this might be the building blocks to making a decision on your future career path.

I would like to encourage all our learners, to seize the opportunities that are available to you at this expo, to broaden your horizons and venture into career paths which would add much value and alleviate the demand for scarce skills. The future is yours to shape and to harness and I have no doubt that through this initiative, you are well placed to do so.
